- 1. Write an appreciative note on any one artworks of Indus Valley Civilization?
 - Answer: The <u>Mother Goddess</u> sculpture is one of the finest example of terracotta sculpture of Indus Valley Civilization. The main features of this sculpture are:
 - It is made of clay and then baked as per the Terra Cotta process.
 - To achieve an unblemished red color the baking is perfectly done.
 - It was identified as "mother goddess" by some scholars.
 - The headgear of this statue comprises two small-bowl-like forms on both sides of the head. These were probably used as lamps.



- These two bowls are balanced by an elaborate hairstyle in the middle of the head.
- The figure is wearing a miniskirt with a broad belt to hold it in place.
- It is adorned with jewellery

Answer: Terracotta is a **brownish-red clay** that has been baked and is used for making things such as flower pots, small statues, and tiles.

3. Describe some features of Indus Valley Art?

Answer: Some features of Indus valley art are:

- The artists and craftsmen of Indus Valley were extremely skilled in handling all kinds of material like metal, stone carving, terracotta and painting pottery.
- These artists preferred to use simplified motifs of animals, birds and plants.
- They were influenced by their religious beliefs.
- The cult of Siva and Shakti is very prominent in all their art works.

1	Mother Goddess	 It is made of clay and then baked as per the Terra Cotta process. To achieve an unblemished red color the baking is perfectly done. The headgear of this statue comprises two small-bowl-like forms on both sides of the head. These were probably used as lamps. These two bowls are balanced by an elaborate hairstyle in the middle of the head. The figure is wearing a miniskirt with a broad belt to hold it in place. It is adorned with jewellery.
2	Seal with Bull design	 The seal is made of Steatite. It has an elaborate intaglio design of a bull. The size of bull's horns and humps are big to show power and strength. 3	Storage Jar	 This jar is made on potter's wheel with clay. After baking the clay model, it was painted with black colour. The motifs are vegetals and geometric forms.
